

CEA Retirement Banquet

1,785 years, 384,075 days, 64,260 Fridays and 64,260 Mondays.

These are the numbers describing the service of the CEA members retiring this year from Columbus City Schools. CEA Vice President Phil Hayes recited the numbers and introduced the stories behind them: 59 retirees -the "class" of 2014—who stepped onto the podium one at a time to receive thanks from colleagues and guests.



Almost 400 attended the 38th Annual CEA Awards & Retirement Banquet on Saturday, May 17, at the Hilton Columbus Downtown. The event celebrates our retirees and others whose efforts on behalf of the Association and public education have exceeded the call of duty.

The Outstanding Member Award went to Traci Arway, who has always promoted public education and the work of Columbus teachers. Traci is an active member of Teachers for Better Schools, our political action arm. At the 2013 NEA RA, she was one of two members in Ohio in competition for "Member Advocate of the Year." Traci also was the teaching face of the recent school levy campaign.

Sue Misiak, retiring host of "Teacher Talk," on 90.5 WCBE-FM radio, received the President's Award. CEA President Rhonda Johnson read a portion of an email to Misiak from one of her students who today is a teacher. Misiak helped her overcome her shyness and hone her leadership skills by encouraging her to get more involved in school activities and to attend and stay in college.

The President's Award also went to CEA Staff Consultant Rick Logan and his partner, Carol Wagner, who passed away on Mar. 20. Logan held up the plaque inscribed to them, declaring tearfully, "Carol, this is for you!"

The Innovator in Education Award went to Columbus State Community College (CSCC) and The American Electric Power Foundation for Credits Count. This partnership prepares CCS students for STEM careers and a dualenrollment program with CSCC. AEP granted \$5 million to create a partnership.

This year's Friend of Education is the Central Ohio Labor Council, AFL-CIO. Executive Director Walt Workman accepted the award for fighting for working families in the education of their children. "They have always stood with us in the fight to protect public education, collective bargaining and the right to vote," said Rhonda Johnson.

Interested in becoming a Cooperating Teacher?

Human Resources is preparing for field observation, methods and student teaching/internship placements for the 2014–2015 school year, especially those who will begin in the fall. In order to be considered as a cooperating teacher, the minimum expectations include three years successful experience and Highly Qualified Teacher status.

Productive and effective student placements are one of our most powerful recruitment tools, as well as a mechanism to eliminate unwarranted stereotypes of urban education. Principals and district offices are currently compiling recommendations. If you possess these qualities and want to be on the list for consideration, talk to your principal this week.

NEW: Print your contract online

If you possess a limited contract or a first-time, continuing contract for the 2014–2015 school year, you will be required to download and print your own contract. It can be found on the Intranet under Human Resources, Systems & Staffing, Teacher Contracts or externally at http://www.columbus.k12.oh.us/teachercontracts.

To print your individual contract, log-in with your ILEAD/ Evaluation username and password. An original, signed copy of your contract must be returned to your principal or supervisor no later than the end of work day on May 30, 2014. Sign your contract even if it does not identify your correct assignment for next school year. If you are working under a continuing contract, you can view your "Notice of Proposed Assignment." No signature is required.

Note: Tutors, latchkey teachers and part-time hourly teachers will receive their contracts from their supervisors by June 15.
