Rallying for change

Hundreds of CPS teachers from across the district converged at the Aladdin Shrine Center on May 25 to participate in the CEA Spring Fling and Rally for Public Education.

Teachers and their colleagues participated in grassroots political action signing of the Ohio Fair Funding Amendment petition.

Members also joined Teachers for Better Schools (TBS), the political action arm of CEA. Ongoing financial support provided by TBS members allows us to screen and support candidates who have the best interests of teachers, students and public education at heart.

Teachers also signed letters to be sent to Ohio Senators Goodman, Harris and Stivers in support of the Governor's budget as originally introduced. The letters asked for support in reintroducing Gov. Strickland's proposed charter school moratorium and his suggested elimination of the EdChoice voucher program and calling for the removal of a recently added Special Education Voucher amendment.

Columbus Public Schools PTA President Robyn Taylor and East HS student Veronica Rhoades spoke at the rally to affirm their support for strong schools in our district.

In his speech to the Columbus teachers, Gov. Strickland said, "Public education cannot work with more charter schools. It cannot work with more money being taken out of the system. I support a moratorium on charter schools and the elimination of the EdChoice voucher program." Gov. Strickland who went on to note his lack of support for STEM schools.

CEA President Rhonda Johnson thanked the Governor, noting "Public schools should not be demonized, privatized or voucherized. They should not be sold to the highest bidder. We need to invest in our public schools." She added "The next step is to call your state legislators and tell them to support Governor Strickland." Your state representatives will soon vote on a bill to expand the school voucher program.

House Bill 26 creates Urban Homestead Zones in cities with declining populations (meaning the "Ohio 8" urban school districts— Akron, Canton, Cincinnati, <u>Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, Toledo</u>



and Youngstown). It would allow homeowners in these cities who spend at least \$120,000 on residential improvements or construction to obtain school vouchers for their children and a private security force for their protection.

Supt. Harris commits to joint labormanagement committee

CEA President Rhonda Johnson and Supt. Gene Harris are forming a joint labor-management committee. The goal will be to improve trust and respect, so that everyone can focus on the main objective: improving teaching and learning. The committee will consist of 12 members with equal representation from administration and CEA leadership.

The superintendent and deputy superintendent met with the CEA President and Vice President on Apr. 24 and compiled a list of the concerns everyone has in common.

The main challenges are trust, inclusion of all parties at key meetings, avoiding assumptions and sharing concerns before they become out of control. Key issues identified for discussion include items such as school closings, math/science intervention, proposed changes in programming, charter schools, adoption of reading materials, shortening of the school day and school funding.

The parties agreed that certain expectations should become standard if the relationship between the administration and the Association is to remain strong. These include establishing a vehicle for regular communications, producing meeting minutes that can be shared, including teachers and principals in the process and summarizing action steps, assignments and agreements so everyone knows what's expected.

An agreement was also made to keep parents informed of school decisions and to include them as appropriate.

SES tutoring program update

Plans are moving forward on the Supplemental Education Services (SES) tutoring program that the CEA Foundation hopes to offer next school year. The Foundation was approved by ODE to offer SES mandated by the *No Child Left Behind Act*.

High standards and high expectations will make the CEA Foundation program exceptional. CPS will benefit from a solid after-school tutoring effort from a high quality SES provider. At this time, a number of questions remain unanswered. These include even the basic information of which schools will be eligible for service. More details will be available in an upcoming issue of *The Voice*.

Standards-based report card for all elementary schools 2007

CPS plans to implement the Standards Based Report Card in all elementary schools in the 2007–2008 school year. The report card is the product of a joint CEA/Administration committee.

Teachers are in the process of receiving training on the new card, including how to complete the card electronically. They are being trained on factors and criteria for grading, student assessments, knowledge of standards and scoring and providing effective feedback for students, parents and administrators. Teachers will receive grade books, pacing guides and other resources to assist in this grading transition.

Professional development will be provided this summer, as well as during the 2007–2008 school year. This training will include additional opportunities to support the Standards Based Report Card, such as effectively using curriculum guides and developing and using checklists and rubrics.

While there have been some challenges, positive feedback has been received from teachers piloting the new card.
