RIMP Update

As you know, your Union grieved the Superintendent's unilateral raising of the third grade cut score for RIMPs. CEA did this because we believe labeling students who are reading at or above grade level, for the sole purpose of gaming a flawed state report card, is wrong.

On Tuesday, Oct. 1, CEA held a press conference on the steps of the Columbus Education Center prior to the Board's meeting. At the press conference, CEA member and third grade teacher, Jaquia Hearn (West Broad ES), explained how this directive hurt our students, their families, and our members. At the meeting, CEA President John Coneglio delivered more than 150 letters from third grade teachers to the Board of Education requesting a change in the RIMP score. Additionally, third grade teachers Benita Smith (East Columbus ES) and Rachel Concitis (Winterset ES) explained to the Board why this decision was not good for kids.

Your Union was appreciative of the thoughtful questions that the Board members asked. The Superintendent stated, "we acknowledge the decision that we made may not have been in the best interest of all parties." This decision was not made in anyone's best interest—especially our students. Your Union takes offense at the Superintendent's statement suggesting that the decision was arrived at in a collaborative fashion with CEA. Telling someone what you're going to do without seeking any input is not collaboration.

The Superintendent suggested that a joint committee be formed to address the situation. Your Union has had productive conversations with Board members about this issue since the meeting. On Thursday, Oct. 3, the CEA Board of Governors met and unanimously approved CEA President John Coneglio's appointments to the committee. The committee will meet with the administration Monday, Oct. 14, to attempt to arrive at a solution.

If our District leadership is serious about moving the achievement needle and avoiding state takeover, they must work with teachers to shape policies that truly benefit our students. Policies or unilateral directives that are dictated from above with little to no consideration about their implementation or their impact on students, teachers, and their family are doomed to failure. Your Union must be a significant part of this process. If our members' concerns fall on deaf ears, we will find a way to make the right people listen.

Teachers are the professionals and work daily to ensure the academic success of our students. We have more impact on our students then any principal, district official, or Superintendent. It's better for CEA to be at the table when policies are made than to be gaveled down at the Board podium trying to express why something is wrong for our kids.

CCS is opening the pool for Peer Assistance & Review

(PAR) Consulting Teachers (CTs). Current certificated CEA members, who want to grow as teacher leaders, are encouraged to apply. PAR CTs provide consulting, coaching/feed-



back, and support services to intern and intervention teachers who enter the CCS PAR Program. Individuals with the following licensure/certification are highly encouraged to apply: Special Education, Unified Arts, World Languages, High

PAR is a nationally recognized model highly thought of as one of the best mentoring programs for teachers. CTs' responsibilities include serving as evaluators for the Ohio Teacher Evaluation System (OTES). CTs must complete the OTES and Resident Educator training through the Ohio Department of Education. Eligible teachers must hold a bachelor's degree in education, an active Ohio teaching license, and have a minimum of five years teaching experience with at least three years of experience with CCS. They also must have:

- Strong technology skills
- Excellent oral and written communications skills
- Demonstrated leadership skills at both building and district levels
- Demonstrated ability to work cooperatively, effectively, and objectively with other professional staff members while maintaining confidentiality
- Demonstrated understanding of adult developmental characteristics
- Extensive knowledge of multiple classroom management and instructional techniques
- Demonstrated flexibility, adaptability, and strong organizational skills
- Strong work ethic and integrity
- Strong knowledge and understanding of the CCS District and the urban school setting

Submit a letter of interest, a résumé, and a letter of reference from your current building administrator, a current CEA Senior Faculty Representative, and one other professional reference. Submit all documentation to CEA President John Coneglio at 929 E. Broad Street, Columbus, OH 43205 no later than Oct. 18, 2019. This is a selective interviewing process with interviews taking place in November 2019. Selection to be in the PAR Pool does not mean an immediate placement. Those selected to be in the pool will remain active for up to five years.
